WHAT DOES 'CIVICS' MEAN? WILLIAM JAMES AND THE CIVIC RENEWAL OF CONTEMPORARY AMERICAN EDUCATION

In recent years, calls for a renewed commitment to civics in American education have grown more frequent and urgent. But what's really wrong with American civics? Should civics help students know their polity, or help them know how to change it? The importance of William James' writings for everyday classroom practice are illustrated by the Third Way Civics initiative for undergraduate civic learning at Ball State University.

This interactive workshop explores how civic identity, community aesthetics, and democratic life play out in the creation of parks in the United States. Participants will learn about the historical evolution of American parks and then engage in a hands-on design exercise, collaborating in small groups to create a fictional park within the Muncie community. Drawing on methods used by landscape architects—including stakeholder mapping, visioning exercises, and participatory design strategies—participants will explore how public spaces can reflect shared values, accommodate diverse needs, and strengthen civic character.

POLITICS AND THE EVERYDAY IN “MIDDLETOWN”

This lecture introduces the Everyday Life in Middletown (EDLM) project, a collaborative, community-based creative project. The presentation considers how and when political engagement figures in the everyday lives these writers describe. Attendees will learn about the idea of political hobbyism, as well as the impact of the rise of social media use and the decline of the local press on feelings about politics and civic engagement.

LATERAL READING AND ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE: TOOLS FOR CIVIC AWARENESS

We introduce a simple framework and demonstrate how AI tools like ChatGPT and browser extensions can support real-time verification. Participants will receive a handout to share these practices in civic spaces. The goal is to decrease polarization caused by controversial news and promote digital responsibility and informed civic engagement.
